DANIEL Craig has changed his mind and is set to sign up for his fifth Bond movie - with Adele lined up to join him.

The actor, 48, claimed he would "rather slash my wrists" than play 007 again but his U-turn came after a host of British stars were tipped to replace him.

The Wire star Idris Elba, Peaky Blinders' Tom Hardy, Happy Valley villain James Norton and Poldark's Aidan Turner were all contenders.

But Bond producer Barbara Broccoli is said to have secured Craig - and we can reveal she is "determined" that superstar singer Adele will record the theme tune.

The partnership made 2012's Skyfall the most profitable Bond ever with takings of £885million.

Her song Skyfall was the first Bond theme to win at the Brit Awards, Grammy Awards and Golden Globes. Although Adele had to cancel the final two shows of her world tour because of damaged vocal chords, Barbara is said to be "talking the singer round".

She believes "Bond25" can start filming next year and will be a sure fire hit.

A source involved in the project said: "Craig and Adele together are the winning team, the ultimate choice, the money spinners.

"It's taken time but Daniel has come round and the strong consensus in the Bond offices is that Mr Craig is 007 again.

"As for Adele, she's more of an unknown quantity but loved being part of Bond, so the signs are positive."

The insider said Craig's actress wife Rachel Weisz, 47, is "on board with the decision" for him to spend a year away filming.

Craig claimed in 2015 that if he did play the spy again "it would be for the money."

He was said to have been offered up to £120million for two more films. Skyfall and Spectre scriptwriter John Logan is also said to be involved in the project.

BRITONS spend more than £2,000 a year each in high street coffee shops, new research shows.

On average we visit a coffee shop 152 times a year and spend £13.85 on trips lasting 93 minutes.

The trend reflects the rising number of chains and our increasing use of them as "coffices" to do business.

New figures show there

are now 21,000 outlets compared to £8.52, plus £5.33 getting there. The five of us spend part of the working 9,000 in 2006.

The boom is fuelled not only by giants such as Starbucks and Costa but also by supermarkets and pubs.

Researchers asked 1,036 Brits how often they went to a coffee

shop, the reason why and how much it cost. Around 80 per cent

total annual amount is £2,110 eight per cent of the average £27,000 a year salary.

Britain's biggest coffee drinkers are in the South West, spending £9.62 each time, followed by East Anglia on £9.27, Yorkshire on £9.14 and the North West on £9.

Surprisingly, London comes in sixth place on £8.47. People in the North East spend the least, £7.39.

Market analysts Research Without Borders found four out of

day doing our jobs in coffee shops on phones, laptops and tablets.

A third of those polled, 345, said they had closed deals worth £1,732.

If that is applied across the adult working population of 31.8million, could be worth as much as £14.5billion to the UK economy.

Chris Reily, boss of discount website MyVoucherCodes which commissioned the research, said: "It shows the rise of the 'coffice' as a place for Britons to work.

Cancer mum 'died of hugs' from her dad

A MUM may have died of cancer because her father used to cuddle her as a child, an inquest heard.

Tragic Susan Macgregor, 58, probably came into contact with asbestos on her pipe-fitter father's overalls when he picked her up for a hug after work.

Susan's family were mystified when she was diagnosed in 2015 with mesothelioma, a disease associated with asbestos.

Her husband Dave, 66, of Willington, Derbys, said: "The coroner came up with the most likely cause of her being in contact with asbestos was through her dad's overalls."

Asbestos use in building was banned in 1999.

Cop in dock over three rape charges

A POLICE officer has been charged with three counts of rape.

PC Ryan Canning, 43, was suspended from duty at the start of the inquiry.

Canning, based in Plymouth, is due to appear at Bodmin Magistrates' Court in Cornwall on July 27.

Chiefs at Devon and Cornwall police said they expect the highest standards from staff adding they will "robustly investigate misconduct and alleged criminal offences".

■ A Met officer jailed for an affair with a suspect has been dismissed.

A misconduct hearing found Det Con Grant McPherson, 37, breached professional standards.

Teachers get a zap to béat class stress

TEACHERS are being given electric shocks to fight classroom stress.

The £549 Alpha-Stim device - used by the Army to treat post traumatic stress disorder - sends micro-currents to the brain through the earlobes.

A pilot scheme on 21 teachers at Leigh Academies Trust – which runs 15 schools in Kent - was "extremely encouraging".

Psychologist Jo Buttle said using it for 20 minutes a day "helped reduce the symptoms of anxiety, depression and sleep difficulties among staff.

Studies say around 3,600 of England and Wales' 35,000 teachers quit each year through stress.
